First is our founding in 1937 as the Service League of Pueblo with the Pueblo Day Nursery as its signature project. **Then in February 1977, the Service League joined the membership of Association of Junior Leagues and became the 233rd League in the Association.** Since the inception of the Junior League of Pueblo, we have worked as leaders in our community to found the now named Buell Children's Museum, Teen Outreach, Kids on the Block, Book swaps, Leadership training with our members attending AJLI meetings and trainings, Girls Day Out which later was adopted by Girls Night Out, Literacy programs and our signature event, Kids in the Kitchen. Earlier in this league year several of us inventoried and organized the Junior League storage unit. Let me tell you, that was a small goal but it sure was a victory in my books!



And those ladies aren't done yet. They still have more funds to spend and are researching where to put those dollars to work in our community. We are all so proud to have them with us as New Members in this league!



| 1 12-ounce package semi-sweet chocolate chips | 2 tablespoons butter or margarine |
| 1 14-ounce can sweetened condensed milk | 1 10 ^{1/2} -ounce package miniature marshmallows |
| | 2 cups dry roasted peanuts |

In 1^{1/2} quart dish put chocolate morsels, condensed milk, and butter. Microwave one minute, stir. Microwave one more minute until mixture is smooth. Combine nuts and marshmallows or buttered 9x13-inch pan. Chill 2 hours or until firm. Cut into squares.
