New Members bring holiday cheer to foster community

Over the years, I have attended many events at the Olde Towne Carriage House. But I have never seen as much love, laughter, and goodwill between its walls as I did during Junior League of Pueblo New Members' Project, "Holiday with Heroes" on Dec. 1. The event brought tears to my eyes, and I noticed to many others, as more than 150 foster families and their children crowded into the space to enjoy holiday crafts, cookies, cocoa and time with Pueblo's community "Heroes" – Pueblo Police, District 60 70 Teachers, Veteran's Council Pueblo County Sheriff's Department, SWAT, Medical Personnel, Fire Department, The Go Team Therapy Dogs, Bridges Child Placement Agency, and Kids Crossing Child Placement Agency mentors.



As the New Membership Chair, I could not be more proud of the 24 women who make up this Class, and who were committed - from the very beginning – to create a project that directly impacts the kids in our community who are hurting the most.

The project was originally born out of the ladies' first conversations about increased drug and substance in Pueblo. Conversations quickly turned to the foster community, which has unfortunately experienced an even greater need for foster families due to the increasing number of kids being placed because of substance abuse in the home.

Because of the thoughtful insight of our 2015-17 New Members', the many generous sponsors, and more than 30 willing "Hero" volunteers, those same children experienced an evening of holiday fun with a community that cares.

In addition to hosting a successful event with more than 500 in attendance, and securing television, radio and newspaper coverage to bring awareness to the issue, the Class raised more than \$5,000 to help purchase "Sweet Cases" for those same kids from the two partnering foster agencies, Bridges and Kids Crossing. Sweet Cases include

blanket, stuffed animal, coloring book, crayons, hygiene kit and other donated items. After the purchase of the Cases, the Class will still have additional funds available to donate to a community drug preventive program for our Pueblo's youth.

FUNDS DEVELOPMENT

As we start the 2017 year many people are wondering why we need grants if our fundraisers are doing so well. Grants might not seem that important, but they help our league in many ways. They help us diversify our funding sources. The idea is to have several baskets of income and several grants in the works so that the loss of any one funding source will not be fatal. Grants also allow us to send more of our members to leadership trainings to better our community. Some may be wondering where would we find grants? According to April A. Northstrom a fundraising expert, "One of the biggest and most often overlooked factors in winning foundation funding is relationships. You need to build those first. After you have received support locally you can then move to regional and national funders. Databases are also wonderful resources to help small organizations find funders who support a specific type of organization or field of interest. However, don't forget to look at annual reports and newspaper articles. Who is giving to organizations that are similar to yours? Put any likeminded funder on your mailing list and start sending them materials about your organization (not too many) and the importance of your mission. Don't let your proposal application be the first time a foundation hears about your organization."

Brittany Jones, a three-year veteran of the league, joined JLP to give back to her home town and community while being more involved with the youth in Pueblo.



Hungarian Goulash

| 2 lbs ground sirloin or round | 1 large can mushroom pieces, drained |
| 1 medium onion, chopped | 1 TBS Worcestershire sauce |
| 1 medium green pepper, chopped | Salt and Pepper to taste |
| 1 large can tomatoes (#2 ^{1/2}) | 1 cup cheddar cheese, shredded |
| | 4 cups cooked elbo-roni |

Brown beef in butter, add onions and green pepper, saute with mushrooms. Add tomatoes, simmer 1 hour. Season. Cook elbo-roni, add to mixture, place in casserole, cover with shredded cheese and bake at 350 degrees until cheese melts.
