

While Vickie Clark was here, I was able to talk to her about her personal passions. One of which was her belief behind The National Diaper Bank Network. Did you know that government assistance programs like food stamps do not cover diapers to assist the 5.3 million toddlers and babies in poverty? Direct diaper assistance is 100% supplied by private non-governmental institutions. In one day, a baby can go through 6-10 diapers! The lack of diapers not only hurts the child but perpetuates poverty. Working women, who do not have the sufficient supply of diapers, are unable to take their children to daycare and early childhood education. These women who could be otherwise working are forced to stay at home. By participating in early childhood education, children are three times more likely to participate in higher education.

By hosting diaper drives and donating diapers, the Junior League of Pueblo can make a lasting impact on children's health and basic needs, early childhood education, and allow parents to provide income for their children. The Community Impact Committee would like to enlist not only our member's help, but extend this opportunity to our wonderful community. We would like to reach out to businesses and have a competition of the most diapers donated. Along with our own efforts, we will make a substantial diaper donation.

Working within an already established program will help to ensure our drive is successful and goes directly to our community. The Catholic Charities of Pueblo has a diaper bank that benefits our city. Diaper banks accept a wide variety of donations, for example, opened leftover diaper packs, coupons, and Huggies Reward Points. By offering coupons to businesses, shoppers, and our members, there will be a greater incentive to purchase diapers. Let's face it, if they weren't so expensive, there wouldn't be such a great need!

Honey Pumpkin Pie

- 1 (1lb) can pumpkin 1 teaspoon pie spice 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 eggs beaten

1/2 cup milk1/2 cup light cream1 cup honeyUnbaked pie shell

Blend pumpkin, spice and salt. Beat in remaining ingredients and pour into shell. Bake for 30 minutes at 400 degrees. Reduce heat to 375 degrees and bake 10 minutes longer, or until firm. Cool and serve with whipped cream.
